Treatment	Travel Vaccines (Vaccines Administered Exclusively for the Purpose of Travel)
Commissioning position	<p>The following vaccines may be administered on the NHS exclusively for the purpose of travel if clinically appropriate:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cholera • Diphtheria/ tetanus/ polio • Hepatitis A • Typhoid <p>Vaccinations which are available on the NHS are part of additional services under GMS and registered patients should not be charged for the provision of these services. See <i>Appendix One</i> for vaccine specific information and which brands can be prescribed.</p> <p>The following vaccines should not be prescribed on the NHS exclusively for the purpose of travel:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Meningitis ACWY • Tick borne encephalitis • Hepatitis A/B combinations • Hepatitis B • Japanese encephalitis • Rabies • Yellow fever vaccine • BCG <p>These vaccines should continue to be recommended for travel but the individual traveller will need to bear the cost of the vaccination.</p> <p>See <i>Appendix Two</i> for vaccine specific information.</p> <p>Please also see Worcestershire CCG 'Vaccines Other Than Travel' Position Statement.</p>

Appendix One: Vaccines which may be Administered on the NHS Exclusively for Travel

Cholera

- Not indicated for most travellers.
- Brand which can be prescribed: Dukoral® is the only licensed cholera vaccine in the UK.

Diphtheria/tetanus/ polio

- Brand which should be prescribed for travel: Revaxis® (Td/IPV).
- Brands which should not be prescribed: Infanrix Hexa®, Boostrix-IPV®, Repevax®
- Vaccinations as part of the national programme should be obtained from ImmForm.
- Stock centrally funded by the Department of Health as part of the childhood immunisation programme must NOT be used for the purposes of travel.

Hepatitis A

- Brands which can be prescribed as hepatitis A only: Havrix/ Havrix Junior Monodose®, VAQTA® Adult/Paediatric, Avaxim®

- Brands included: Typhim Vi® and Vivotif® are the brands licensed in the UK.

Appendix TWO: Vaccines which may not be Administered on the NHS Exclusively for Travel

Bacillus Calmette-Guérin (BCG)

- BCG cannot be given as a NHS service for travel.

Encephalitis (including tick borne and Japanese)

- Brands included: TicoVac®, Ixiaro®
- These cannot be given as a NHS service for travel – see [NHS choices](#) and vaccines should not be supplied as a NHS prescription.

Hepatitis A/B combinations

- Brands included: Twinrix®, Ambirix®
- Combined Hepatitis A/B vaccines should not be supplied for travel because hepatitis B vaccine is not available on the NHS for purposes of travel. If required, hepatitis B should be offered to patients as a private service.
- There are specific limited circumstances listed in the Green Book where both hepatitis A and B vaccines are indicated and where a combined product may be prescribed. In such circumstances the indication for the NHS prescription should be recorded on the GP clinical system. Hepatitis A: The Green Book, Chapter 17 - GOV.UK; Hepatitis B: The Green Book, Chapter 18 - GOV.UK

Hepatitis B

- Brands included: Engerix B®, Fendrix®, HBVAXPRO®
- These cannot be given as a NHS service for travel – see [NHS choices](#).
- Vaccines should not be supplied as a NHS prescription or service for occupational health indications.

- There are specific limited circumstances listed in the Green Book where clinicians might be using them: Hepatitis B: The Green Book, Chapter 18 - GOV.UK. In such circumstances the indication for the NHS prescription should be recorded on the GP clinical system.

Meningococcal vaccines

- Brands of vaccine: Meningococcal group B (Bexsero®); Hib and Meningococcal C vaccine (Menitorix®); Meningococcal ACWY (Menveo®, Nimenrix®)
- These cannot be given as a NHS service for travel – see [NHS choices](#).
- Vaccinations as part of the national programme should be obtained from ImmForm.
- In line with the Green Book, additional vaccination against meningococcal disease for individuals who develop asplenia or splenic dysfunction or when complement deficiency is diagnosed depending on age and vaccination history is advised : [Meningococcal; the Green Book Chapter 22- GOV.UK](#). In this circumstance a NHS prescription should be used and the indication recorded on the clinical system.

Rabies

- Brand included: Rabipur®
- These cannot be given as a NHS service for travel – [see NHS choices](#) and vaccines should not be supplied as a NHS prescription for travel or occupational health.
- PHE advice should be sought for post exposure treatment.

Yellow fever

- These cannot be given as a NHS service for travel – [see NHS choices](#).
- These are only available at specialist centres and should not be supplied as a NHS prescription.
